Virtual transatlantic collaboration project between Hochschule Ruhr West and Wayne State University


Virtual Exchange+ is a transatlantic academic collaboration project, funded by the German Ministry of Education and Research through the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) within the scope of the IVAC (International Virtual Exchange Collaboration) program.

Key Facts about the collaboration

- As part of multiple virtual collaborations between the Ruhr West University of Applied Sciences and the Wayne State University, faculty members and 31 students had the opportunity to attend the Virtual Exchange+ Conference in Detroit this year
- For the students, participation in the conference created the opportunity to experience not only a virtual collaboration, but also achieve a higher level of intercultural exchange and strengthen the networking with US-students
- All in all, the students were impressed by the entire conference, had the opportunity to network
 internationally, learn more about the city of Detroit and gain cultural insights into the US-American
 way of life. In addition, all students took away various content-related and personal learning that will
 benefit them in the long term, both in their professional and private life







"Experiencing these shared moments with other students in Detroit and in a time where you usually do not have so many social contacts we grew together as friends." (Darius Mews)










"My best moment was **eating Detroit styled pizza** with a great view over the city with Professor **Jeff Stoltman**.

He was very open-minded and created a relaxed atmosphere by telling us something about the **history of Detroit** and answering our questions." (Alexandra Babiy)
















"Furthermore, the Wayne State University is located in a **safe area** and you simply can **walk to downtown** Detroit." (Laura Witthaut)

"In exchange with other students, I discovered that even if you live in a different country, your personal targets do not vary so much in terms of values, personal goals and experiences; with this being said, I took a big learning for myself in working together with strangers." (Darius Mews)

"It was a chance to meet new people and experience a new culture in a city that is not a typical tourist destination. It was also great to get to know the students from our course much better outside of the university, which unfortunately was hardly possible here in Germany in the last few months due to Corona." "I guess I really take a **big learning for myself** after the trip. During the preparation I had a couple of problems regarding an express ID card or a falsely positive antigen test. But I kept on trying to get it all under control and it went well. So I think I take something like a **"never give up – it will be worth it" learning for myself** after the whole trip." "The trip to the US was a highlight because it was the first time for me in the US. I had the opportunity to get in touch with people from the US, who had a different mindset than we have in Germany. "When I heard of the city Detroit before the conference, I often associated Detroit with a more negative image. But during our stay I learned more about the history, for example in a general presentation about Detroit by Dr. Kevin Deegan-Krause or in a lecture with the topic "Race and Social Activism in Detroit" by Dr. Bryan Ellis. Learning more about the city and exploring Detroit during different walking tours showed that the city has beautiful places to offer, and that the city is incredibly diverse." (Laura Witthaut)
